Updates from the Greenway



Wildwood Park Opening

Phase I in the development of Wildwood Park has been completed, and the park is now open to the public. FROGGS members and volunteers have been active in preparing and maintaining Wildwood park through cleanups and opening day events. Improvements to the park include:

- Parking Lot (135 spaces) with Street Lights
- Shelter Improvements for Outdoor Events
- 1.5 mile Natural Surface Trail
- Sandy Beach
- Kayak Launch
- Floating Dock with 3 Boat Slips
- Waterfront Camping Platform





Phase II development is now underway and is expected to be finished by December 2023. Designs are completed and construction will soon begin on three projects which will expand trail access, create a new mountain bike trail, and add a pump track and bicycle skills course to the park.

The park is open Dawn to Dusk each day, and the newly built camping platform is available for reservations for overnight stays.

Addition into East Coast Greenway System

The South Tar River Greenway has been dedicated as part of the 3,000 mile East Coast Greenway that spans from Maine to Florida. This route stretches from Calais, Maine all the way to Key West, Florida.



The East Coast Greenway links routes for bicycle riders, hikers, or runners to sections of greenways and communities along the east coast for use with little to no vehicle traffic. The addition of our Greenville greenways into this system will uniquely highlight our city and help bring travelers into our community.

Flood History Informational Marker

A new marker will soon be installed at the Town Common at the NW corner near the Tar River flood gage. The marker will not only provide information about the frequencies and extents of recent floods in Greenville, but it will compare flooding from 1998 to 2022. The educational marker was created by one of our own FROGGS board members, Chris Mansfield (highlighted below), and uses data from US geographical surveys to provide accurate information. Be on the lookout for the marker this summer!
